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Rise in no-fee schools

The proportion of schools that do not charge school fees increased from 55% in 2008 to 60% two years later, an overall rise of 9%, according to the South African Institute of Race Relations.

While all provinces experienced an increase in the proportion of schools that do not charge fees in this period, the highest increases were in the Western Cape and the Free State. All other provinces experienced only slight to moderate growth rates.

This is according to data sourced from the Department of Basic Education and Statistics South Africa.

The Free State had the highest proportion of schools that do not charge fees in 2010 (83%), overtaking Limpopo, which had the highest proportion in 2008 (71%).

Despite recording the highest growth rate, the Western Cape still had the second lowest proportion of schools that do not charge fees, although this was still more than double the proportion of such schools in Gauteng.

'While expanding access to education in poor communities is necessary, there is evidence that schools that do not charge for tuition do not perform as well academically when compared to schools that charge relatively low school fees', said Mr Jonathan Snyman, a researcher at the Institute. 'Because of this, the rise in schools that do not charge for tuition needs to be accompanied by the provision of quality education otherwise increased access to education will be meaningless' added Mr Snyman.
