# 60m of us – what it means

Latest population estimates for South Africa from Stats SA show that there are now 60 million South Africans, an increase of nearly 50% compared to the mid-1990s.

Gauteng is now, by some way, the most populous province in the country, with more than one-in-four South Africans making their home there. It is still the preferred destination for South African and foreign migrants – between 2016 and 2021 more than a million people moved there.

The only other provinces which saw their populations grow by more than 100 000 as a result of migration were the Western Cape (nearly 300 000 people moved there between 2016 and 2021) and North West (just fewer than 120 000 people relocated to that province between 2016 and 2021).

The two most striking findings from Stats SA's latest population estimates are the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on South Africa as well as the decline in South Africa's fertility rate. Between July 2020 and June 2021 nearly 660 000 deaths were recorded in South Africa, more than 25% more than in the previous period and the highest since 2008, when the country was in the midst of the HIV/Aids pandemic. It is clear that the virus has had a significant impact on the country with a corresponding decrease in life expectancy.

At the same time, South Africa's fertility rate is now at a record low. On average South African women have 2.3 children in their lifetime. For a country to maintain its population a fertility rate of 2.1 is required, South Africa is still above that but the trend is clear. However, declining fertility is a function of development – women delay having children and have fewer children when they decide to do so as more educational and employment opportunities become open to them.

The key challenge for policymakers in the future will be how to ensure that young people today will have opportunities in the future – nearly 30% of South Africans are under the age of 15. If we do not implement policies which will give our young people a prosperous future South Africa will continue to become even more violent and unstable.






In the same period it is estimated that there was net-migration of  $852\ 991$  foreigners into South Africa.




