The state of South African democracy

One of the great achievements of post-apartheid South Africa has been the robustness of the country's democracy. While in certain areas South Africa has fallen far short, particularly in the creation of jobs and sustainably tackling issues such as poverty, this is not the case with regard to democracy.

While the ANC still dominates electoral politics (although this is changing quickly) South Africans enjoy the other trappings of democracy. People are free to criticise the government or the President without fear of retaliation, the press is free and uses that freedom robustly, and elections – although not without issues – are widely acknowledged as reflecting the will of voters.

This is also reflected in global rankings, with various organisations ranking South Africa as a democracy, although one that does have some issues. For example, the Democracy Index, compiled by the Economist Intelligence Unit ranks South Africa as a 'flawed democracy,' the same category as countries such as the United States, and a number of European countries, including Italy, Spain, Greece, and Poland. Freedom House releases a similar index and rates South Africa as a 'Free' country, one of the few to achieve this ranking in Africa.

However, South Africans may be falling out of love with democracy. As this edition of *Free*FACTS shows the proportion of eligible voters who turn up at the polls is on a downward trend. In the 2021 local government election, for the first time ever, fewer than half of all South African voters turned out for a nationwide post-apartheid poll.

In addition, a survey conducted by Afrobarometer, showed that a large proportion of South Africans would be willing to live under a dictatorship if that meant that there would be job creation and law and order.

This should serve as a warning that continued economic failure could have serious implications for the sustainability of democracy in South Africa, with a growing proportion of people willing to give up their freedoms if it means that other basic needs are met.

This is not a threat that can or should be ignored.



a The Democracy Index is calculated by analysing 60 indicators which are grouped into five categories: electoral process and pluralism, civil liberties, the functioning of government, political participation, and political culture. In 2020, South Africa is ranked 44th out of 167 countries, with an overall score of 7.05 out of a possible 10. The index ranked South Africa as a flawed democracy.

Note: South Africa has shown a small but clear decline on the *Democracy Index*, with its score (out of ten) showing a steady drop. However, this has been something of a global trend, with many countries seeing some level of democratic backsliding. Of the five pillars analysed by the EIU South Africa does best on political participation, where it receives a score of 8.33 out of ten and worst on political culture, with a score of 5.



b Countries are ranked on 15 elements of civil liberties, each ranked on a scale of 0 to 4, and given a score out of 60. The two above scales are then combined and it is determined whether a country is 'Free,' 'Partly Free,' or 'Not free.'

Note: South Africa's rating has been relatively stable over the years and is normally rated as 'Free'.
